Dennis F. Quebe a man for all seasons

Dennis F. Quebe recently retired as CEO of Quebe Holdings. A celebration of his career was held on June 29.

Dennis entered the electrical industry as an electrician's helper for a NECA contractor in 1975, soon after his discharge from the US Marine Corps. He was an aircraft electrician in the Marines, Number One graduate in his class and recipient of the Commendation as Honor Man. He was also the top graduate of his **Electrical Apprenticeship** Program and earned the highest-grade point average of the 30-member class.

This early commitment to being a high achiever is the cornerstone of a career that has led Dennis from an entrylevel position to Owner and Chief Executive Officer of Quebe Holdings in Dayton, Ohio.

Dennis joined Chapel in 1989 as Executive Vice-President and was named President in 1992. While Dennis was President, Chapel went through transformational changes that set their company apart in the industry.

Very early Dennis and the Chapel team began to leverage their healthcare experience to complete projects both locally and nationally. Some of these healthcare projects included: Dayton VA Hospital; Genesis Healthcare - Flint, Michigan; St Vincent Hospital - Worcester, Massachusetts; Monroe Carell Jr. Children's Hospital -Nashville, TN; Vanderbilt University Medical Research, IV - Nashville, TN; and Middle Tennessee Medical Center -Murfreesboro, TN. These projects were delivered under contracting methodologies that became the norm after another 20 years passing.

Dennis has been and is still active in the electrical contracting industry, locally serving on various committees and organizations including Western Ohio National
Electrical Contractors
Association, National Joint
Apprenticeship and Training
Committee (Electrical Training
Alliance), Labor Management
Cooperation Committee, Health
and Welfare Trust, Pension
Committee, Labor Management
Committee and Negotiating
Committees and always
serving in a leadership
position.

Dennis became an Owner and CEO in 2002 when he purchased Chapel, Romanoff and Dynalink Electric.

His decision to form Quebe Holdings kept the publicly traded corporation from closing these businesses and saved more than 200 jobs. The company grew further with the acquisition of

JATC Journeyman graduation 2023

Is there an electrician in the house? The Dayton JATC Technical Training Center for Electrical Apprentices graduated another class of Journeymen on May, 4, 2023, with most of the ceremony taking place in the dark with an electrical outage due to a storm! The graduates included 30 Inside Wiremen (the largest class in many years) and one Installer Technicians.

An often overlooked career path for high school graduates is an apprenticeship program. Apprenticeship programs consists of a combination of on-the-job training (earning while you learn) and classroom instruction, for which college credit is available.

On average, an apprentice will earn \$150,000 in four years (the length of most apprenticeship programs). The apprentice learns the skills of the trade through on the job training, working alongside an experienced journeyman who passes on the skills that he or she has learned over the

years. In addition to the on the job training, the apprentice receives related classroom instruction that produces competency and pride that leads to becoming a true craftsman.

The top Inside Wireman graduate was Elizabeth Chandler with a 5 year GPA of 97.49 and the top Installer Technician graduate was Gary Van Kampen with a four year average of 91.18.

Dennis began his involvement with NECA locally with the Western Ohio Chapter as accredited representative, President, and Governor before beginning his ascent on a national level. As with his other endeavors, he served the National organization in leadership roles as well, including Executive Vice President for District 2 for 4 years before becoming National President Elect in 2012 and National President in 2013 – 2014. While serving in National NECA, Dennis supported and participated in many committees and task force to improve the electrical contracting industry and is still involved in many of these groups today.

Dennis was also recognized by NECA for his outstanding contributions to the contracting industry

many awards and recognitions, in particular the Academy of Electrical Contracting. This is bestowed upon outstanding leaders in the electrical contracting industry and it preserves and utilizes their wealth of experience and knowledge for the benefit of the

industry. Fellows of the Academy have rendered exceptional service to the industry and the National

> Electrical Contractors Association, and that service is continued and enhanced through their fellowship in the Academy.

As Dennis once noted in his first Electrical Contractor Magazine Article, – "A quote from Theodore Roosevelt best explained his involvement in the National Electrical Contractors Association and electrical industry

affairs - "Every man owes part of his time and money to the business or industry to which he engages. No man has a moral right to withhold his support from an organization that is striving to improve conditions within his sphere".

Not only did Dennis contribute his time to the

electrical contracting industry he has also contributed his time and financial support to many local organizations and causes to support community needs including Grandview, Kettering and Premier Medical Foundations, Helmets to Hardhats, Vietnam Veterans Memorial and many more.

According to Chapel President Buck Ross, "Our companies are better today because Dennis has been a part of them. Successful companies are the result of good people, good leadership, and both of those working together drive positive outcomes. Dennis's lifelong trait of being an over achiever, never waned from when he was a Marine and his early apprenticeship days, and this has been impactful to the success of our companies and the personal lives of many. All of us, employees and myself included, have benefitted from Dennis's leadership and kindness and we thank him for this."

Welcome Stadium renovation by Chapel & CRT

The 11,000 seat facility first opened in 1949. Over the decades, minor upgrades have been made but nothing as large

as the current project. The "Welcome" is not a greeting, but honors the late Percival Welcome, longtime Director of Athletics for the Dayton Public Schools.



High schools

use the stadium for their football season. It's also a popular venue for track and field — especially district and statewide competitions.

Chapel Electric and Chapel Romanoff Technologies (CRT) are the electrical contractors for this project. Chapel will have completed over 20,000 man hours in a six month period to help renovate the concourse, concession stands, locker rooms, Team Sprit shop, and Press Box. Their scope of work includes new electrical distribution throughout the complex, upgraded LED lighting, new concession stand equipment, elevator access to the press box and new field

CRT is providing a new design for the Welcome Stadium sound system. From early budgeting to subsequent design meetings, CRT was able to work with the project team and school technical staff to design a sound system that met the functional requirements, mitigated significant product lead times, and met project deadlines.

The system includes new tower speakers, and

press box speakers to provide sound coverage over both the home and visitor bleachers. Speakers are also included for the concourse areas under each bleacher. The system is

designed for an 'easy' mode, allowing users to operate basic audio controls from a touch screen.

The scope also included AV cabling infrastructure for all new microphone inputs, a wired production

intercom system, video camera locations, and press camera locations, both on the field and in the press box.

Due to
manufacturer lead time
issues, CRT has utilized
some of the existing
material to allow continued
operation of the sound
system during the opening
football season. The
remaining new equipment
will be installed between
seasons.

The Welcome Stadium renovations will modernize the facilities, improve accessibility, and ultimately turn the stadium into a state-of-the-art complex suitable for Division 1 high school and Division 3 college athletics.
